COURSE OBJECTIVES

At the conclusion of this educational activity, the participant should be able to:

- Provide an overview of the factors that contribute to difficult encounters with patients
- Review some general strategies for promoting more positive encounters with patients
- Discuss essential medications in palliative care
- Examine the risks of common geriatric pain medications
- Explore realistic interdisciplinary pain control strategies to decrease medication
- Contrast the presentation of Alzheimer's type of dementia with other common forms of dementia
- List strategies for gathering clinical data needed to diagnose common forms of dementia

- Identify the distortions in thinking about depression and expand repertoire of treatment options
- Develop a plan of follow up for the maintenance of depression recovery
- Identify syndromes of psychosis in the elderly and find treatment options aside from use of D2 antagonists
- Encourage the family in treatment plans and developing alliances
- Explain how primary care providers can address their patients' needs in responding to Medical Assistance in Dying (MAID) through conversations on eligibility criteria, implementation and clinical and ethical challenges

Workshop #1: 1300-1500 | Intra-Articular and Soft Tissue Injections in Arthritis | Facilitator: Mike Templeton

Participants will review the most common soft tissue injuries presenting to primary care professionals. They will learn how to differentiate injuries that can be safely managed through splinting and taping and how to discuss this with their patients. They will review the most up to date materials and techniques available to the medical expert and will demonstrate how to perform common taping and splinting techniques.

Workshop Objectives:

- Identify the most common soft tissue sports injuries
- Use best medical evidence to differentiate which injuries can be managed by taping and splinting and discuss this with their patients
- Identify current splinting and taping materials that are available to primary care clinicians
- Demonstrate how to tape a splint various joints such as ankles, wrists, and shoulders on a simulations model

Workshop #2: 1300-1700 | Basic Cardiac Life Support | Facilitator: Milton Good

Participants will acquire skills in resuscitation through hands on simulations testing ensuring competency in the medical expert role. Acquiring knowledge in the most up to date evidence based teaching of resuscitation principles will fulfill scholastic roles. The role of the learner in relation to others during resuscitation will be addressed. Also, the importance of maintenance of BCLS or more comprehensive resuscitation among all health care providers will be discussed.

Workshop Objectives:

- Identify the most up to date guidelines for CPD, obstruction therapy and AED use
- Explain their role as a rescuer during a resuscitation event
- Demonstrate resuscitation on a pediatric and adult simulator
